The President's Message

Also, for this SAR year, most committees that I have appointed will have all members living in the same geographical area. I hope this will enable the committees to be more functional as a unit with all members contributing. There will be some exceptions, however, these will be at a minimum. I am asking leach committee chairman to furnish me with a brief written report at a mid-

point between meetings of the Board of Managers. I firmly believe this change will enhance our Society if the Committee chairmen perform as expected. Your help will be essential.

This column is my way of communicating with each member of our Society. I solicit your suggestions for a better Society, a better SAR Bulletin, or comments on any other subject you might want to discuss. My address and telephone number appears elsewhere in this bulletin.

Compatriots, the next twelve months can be most interesting and fascinating if we make only a small effort to support the objectives of this Society. I urge all Chapters to have regular meetings. Augustus diZerega of the Kansas Society was nominated for VP General for the coming year. LOCAL ACTIONS

El Paso Chapter - Mrs. Mainz, a second generation American from the Balkans, gave a tape and slide presentation on the evolution of the Great Seal of the US.

Panhandle Plains Chapter - In February, Compatriot Finley presented a picture program on Egypt, and Dr. Merrill Winsett gave a talk on Biblical History in March.

Nathan Gan Chapter - Meeting jointly with the DAR, they received a talk from Dr. John Harper on "heraldry."

<u>Capt. John McAdams Chapter</u> - Held an election of officers and Langston Goree was a principal speaker at the March meeting.

Hill Country Chapter - Compatriot George Tate presented a program about the life of George Washington in February. Detective Keith Saurer gave a talk on Crime Prevention in January.

Paul Carrington Chapter - In February, the chapter presented to Senator Harry Byrd of Virginia the "George Washington Distinguished Service Award." This consisted of a portrait of Washington in prayer. This meeting was held at the River Oaks Country Club.

<u>Dallas Chapter</u> - In March, State President Clovis Brakebill gave a slide presentation on Yorktown and the chapter sponsored a Drill and Rifle Competition for the JR.ROTC in the area. In April, Gen. Andrew P. Rollins spoke on "Washington's Legacy for Engineers."

Houston Chapter - Sponsored the winner of the Texas Oration contest, DeWayne Layfield, of Vidor High School. He will represent the Texas Society in Portland this summer at our National Congress.

<u>Heart of Texas Chapter</u> - Winner of the Walter Sterling plaque for being the outstanding Chapter in the State during the year 1981.

Walter G. Sterling Plaque

This award to the outstanding SAR Chapter in Texas was established by the Board of Managers in 1973. It has been won over the years by various Chapters who have always enjoyed an outstanding year.

In recent years, the entry list of Chapters has declined and the principle criteria for winning has been the Chapter scrapbook.

The rules for judging the Chapters competing for this award were listed in the Fall 1973 edition of the SAR Bulletin. These rules are again listed for the guidance of the Chapters. Additionally, the Board of Managers has assigned a point value to each category. This has been done to make the judging more objective in nature.

All activities for consideration shall take place during the calendar year immediately preceding the Annual State Convention. Only Items 1 and 9 are excepted. These items will be presented at the State Convention.

Included in the media publicity will be Chapter news that appears in the SAR Bulletin. To be published in the SAR Bulletin, the articles must be especially written and mailed to the editor.

This revision in contest rules is made in an effort to induce more activities in the many Chapters of this Society. The participation of each Chapter is urged.

Each Chapter will prepare its own numerical scoring sheet and forward it to the Chairman of the Awards Committee not later than February 15 following the Contest year. Documentation must accompany the score sheet, except for the annual report and the scrapbook.

The Walter G. Sterling Plaque will be awarded at the banquet at the State meeting.

President's Membership Awards

These awards were first suggested by President Clovis Brakebill at the State meeting in Fort Worth on March 6, 1982, and approved by the Board of Managers on March 7, 1982.

There will be two permanent plaques given each year to the President of a Chapter that excells in one of two categories of growth. One plaque will be awarded to the Chapter President whose Chapter has the largest numerical increase between April 1 and December 31. The other plaque will be given to the Chapter President whose Chapter has the largest percentage of increase between April 1 and December 31.

The April 1 Chapter membership count will be the one submitted by the State Secretary to the National Office. The closing date of December 31 will enable the awards committee adequate time to determine the winning chapters. In event of a tie in either category, the starting date shall be moved back one year.

The awards committee will accumulate data from the State Secretary and will have status reports published in each issue of the SAR Bulletin.

The award plaques will be personalized and will be the permanent property of the winning Chapter Presidents.

These awards are authorized to stimulate Chapters in obtaining new members under the leadership of the Chapter President.
