Founding of America History - 250th Anniversary

Looking Back on 1775...


1775... The Beginnings of Revolution. 1775 was indeed a pivotal moment in the history of the birth of our nation. As we march towards July 4th, 1776, remembering 250 years of the signing of The Declaration of Independence, we remember those moments in this issue that helped shape our Declaration...

The beginning of 1775 saw the Intolerable Acts in full force. Boston was being surrounded by an armada of British ships, enforcing bans on trading, blockading the city, and rounding up individuals associated with the rebel colonists. It marked a more decisive effort by King George to make the colonies pay, but especially Boston, for dumping tea into the harbor on that fateful December day in 1774, which became known as "The Boston Tea Party." England took extraordinary steps to bring the colonies back into compliance with English Law, but further ignited the already smoldering timbers that drove the colonies to rebel more.



On that fateful day of April 18th, in the late hours, Paul Revere, Samuel Prescott, and William Dawes began alerting the colonists outside of Boston that "The Redcoats Are Coming, The Redcoats Are Coming..." The story would later become romanticized in literature by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow in a poem, "Paul Revere's Ride" and etch that memorable line of "One if by land and Two if by sea." The warning was to alert the militia located in Lexington and Concord, that British troops would be coming to confiscate the munitions and other supplies located in those towns. On April 19th, in those early morning hours, "The Shot Heard 'Round The World" echoed through time, and decidedly marked the first shot fired in the Revolution. While British troops first declared a victory in Lexington, it would be at Concord where they would be forced to fall back due to the ragtag colonial militia and markedly boosted the morale of those seeking independence.

May 10, 1775, the Second Continental Congress convenes and elects John Hancock to be its President of the Congress. Their meeting would again be marked by dueling ideals - to continue down the path of independence, or, to make reasonable attempts at peace and return life to normal as dutiful servants to the Crown. An "Olive Branch Petition" was dividably sent to King George, requesting a return to normalcy; a petition which was summarily rejected by the King. As the colonies continued debating on the divisions, on June 10th, John Adams proposed the formation of a Continental Army and would thus need a General to lead such an army. On June 14th, the Continental Army was born and on June 15th, George Washington was named General and Commander-in-Chief of the Army.



While the Congress worked to form the army, General Thomas Gage, who was overseeing Massachusetts, instituted martial law on June 12th and stated that anyone found to be supporting the rebellion would be considered a rebel and traitor to the crown. It was soon discovered on June 17th that colonists were fortifying a hill and British forces from the navy began firing from the harbor. The battle became known as "The Battle of Bunker Hill" and ultimately, the colonists lost the hill.

On July 3rd, George Washington officially took command of the Continental Army. Riding out in front of the newly formed troops at Cambridge, he drew his sword and instituted his authority over the army. On July 6th, after Congress formally adopted sending the "Olive Branch Petition," Congress votes to authorizes its "Declaration on the Causes and Necessity of Taking Up Arms." Unofficially a declaration towards independence, the document lays the foundation for the colonies to defend themselves against the aggressions of the British forces, who were invoking more British controls on the colonists. The declaration proclaimed that they would rather "die free men rather than live as slaves."

Out of the chaos of war, a more modern day birth occurred with the formation of the colonial Postal Service. July 26th saw the inception of the U.S. Postal Service, with Benjamin Franklin being named the first Postmaster General.



September 1st, King George summarily rejects the “Olive Branch Petition,” without ever having read a word of the document. When notice was made that the King had refused to read the petition, it caused colonists further resolve in the necessity of independent rule, rather than those of a tyrant king. Reconciliation, it seemed, had become futile.



War, it seems, is not without deceit. On October 5th, General Washington writes to the Congress that a letter from Doctor Benjamin Church, the surgeon general of the Continental Army, had been intercepted on its way to General Gage. Dr. Church, only three months as the surgeon general, had been accused of espionage through his letter. As a spy, he was convicted and sentenced to life in prison. As a consequence of this action, Congress elected on November 7th to add the death penalty as punishment for espionage to its “articles of war.”



October 13th saw the need for a navy and thus was born the Continental Navy. On December 22nd, Esek Hopkins was appointed as the first Commander-in-Chief of the Navy and was tasked with its formation. But with the formation of the navy also came the need for a ship to shore fighting force that could be a landing force and fight at both land and sea. Thus, on November 10th, the birth of the Continental Marines occurred.



November and December saw much more action into Canada. November 13th, Continental Army Brigadier General Richard Montgomery captures Montreal, Canada without opposition. On December 2nd, General Montgomery arrived at the gates of Quebec to join forces with Colonel Benedict Arnold to begin laying siege to the city. The siege became disastrous, lasting for most of December and ending with the death of General Montgomery and Colonel Arnold being seriously wounded.



Thus we end 1775 and onto the beginning of 1776, where more peril for our beleaguered colonists continue. But out of the struggles, a new nation arises, giving birth to a republic that makes the Romans and Greeks pale in comparison. A declaration that will stand the tests of time, a plethora of patriots whose actions resonate with us still today, and a military that 250 years later had its inception with humble beginnings and is the most fearsome in the world. Stay tuned for more yet to come!

An new easy method to archive electronic documents was developed last year. Chapter Web Admins for years have been able to post public newsletters, articles, officers, committee chairs, histories, awards, speakers, photos, inmemoriums, obituaries, etc. to their chapter website. This is a great ongoing solution; great job and keep up the effort! What's new is mainly for private documents. If you have documents of living people with their emails, phones, street address, dates of birth or SSN, then those documents should be either redacted or saved on private websites. The Texas SAR private website does have webspace available for those private documents.

Board of Managers Meeting - Resolution

RESOLUTION OF THE TEXAS SOCIETY SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION



WHEREAS, The Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution conducted its fall meeting of its Board of Managers Meeting on this the 18th day of October, 2025 in Sugarland, Texas, and

WHEREAS, at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Managers, upon motion being duly made, seconded and carried, it adopted the following Resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, On December 9, 1896, The *Galveston Daily News* announced the organization of the **Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution**, and

WHEREAS, The **National Society Sons of the American Revolution** was incorporated on January 17, 1890, in Connecticut and later chartered by the United States Congress on June 9, 1906, said charter being signed by U.S. President Teddy Roosevelt, and

WHEREAS, the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution has a membership across the state totaling about 3,000 members, and

WHEREAS, the national objectives of the national and state societies of SAR are 1) Patriotism, 2) education of our youth about the founding principles of our history and why it is important, and 3) Service to our respective communities, and

WHEREAS, The Texas State Board of Education has not seen fit to educate our Texas children about the substantial assistance rendered to the United States by Spain, by providing the U.S. with cash, arms, ammunition, and other military supplies, and

WHEREAS, the population of Texas is about 40% Hispanic, and

WHEREAS, Hispanic children in Texas are being deprived of their history, and their Hispanic heroes by not instructing them on the valuable contributions by Spain, and

WHEREAS, the teaching of American history without including the contributions of Spain is indefensible, and

WHEREAS, the United States is in the process of celebrating the 250th Anniversary of the founding of our country, and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate on our 250th Anniversary to celebrate the copious amount of arms and ammunition supplied by Spain to the United States, as well as its substantial financial contributions to our war effort.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Managers of the Texas Society Sons of the American Revolution, as follows:

The Texas Legislature is requested to enact a law in Texas at the next legislative session that would:

Require 30 hours of classroom instruction about Spain's assistance during the American Revolutionary War that would include at a minimum, the following instruction:

- a) Spain's relationship with England for the 600 years prior to the Revolution
- b) That the war between the U.S. and England was part of a global war.

- c) Biography of Gen. Bernardo de Galvez
- d) Treaty of 1763 that ended French & Indian War
- e) Causes of the American Revolutionary War stemming from the Treaty of 1763 that ended the French & Indian War.
- f) Benjamin Franklin's advice to establish a Colonial Militia
- g) Mass. Committee of Safety ordering guns and ammunition from Gardoqui & Sons in Bilbao, Spain
- h) Battles of Lexington & Concord – British seeking guns & ammunition from Spain.
- i) Signing of the Bourbon Family Compact on May 1, 1776
- j) Arrival of first shipment of arms & ammunition from Spain to New Orleans on Sep. 1, 1776
- k) Oliver Pollock, financier of the Revolution
- l) Galvez established a Louisiana Militia of Germans, native Americans, Cajuns, free and enslaved Black people
- m) Reasons Spain remained neutral until May 1779
- n) Battle of Manchac, LA
- o) Battle of Fort New Richmond at Baton Rouge, LA
- p) Surrender of Fort Panmure at Natchez, MS
- q) Attack of Ft. Charlotte at Mobile, AL
- r) Spanish fleet headed to Pensacola destroyed by hurricane
- s) Spanish siege of Fort George at Pensacola, FL
- t) Spain's assistance to Gen. George Rogers Clark in upper Midwest
- u) Fort Kaskaskia, Illinois & Fort Cahokia, Illinois
- v) Fort Vincennes, Indiana & Fort Jefferson, Kentucky
- w) Fort San Carlos, Missouri – Attack of British with Indian allies.
- x) Spanish soldiers at the ready in California Presidios
- y) Spanish fleet captures 55 of 63 British ships in Convoy to resupply Boston
- z) Texas connection to the American Revolution – cattle drive

aa) *The Donativo* – Request from the King of Spain for donations throughout the empire.

bb) Arkansas Post, AR

cc) Spanish soldiers from Fort San Carlos travel to and capture Ft. St. Joseph at Niles, Michigan.

dd) Appreciation to Spain – Summary

- a. Spain's Ambassador stood next to Washington at his inauguration.
- b. Letters of Appreciation from U.S. Presidents

"The Texas Connection with the American Revolution."




Captain Allen Clark awarded the DAR Founders Medal for Patriotism by Martie Cenkci Captain Molly Corbin Chapter, NSDAR



Clark, who lost both legs in combat in Vietnam, was nominated for the prestigious award by the Captain Molly Corbin Chapter in Grapevine, Texas, for his continued service to the nation, America's veterans, and disabled persons. The award, which was established in 1995, recognizes citizens who have given unselfishly to the community, state, or nation.

Capt. Clark, a graduate of the US Military Academy at West Point, was recognized for his military service and sacrifice with a Silver Star for gallantry in action, the Purple Heart, and the Combat Infantry Badge. His extensive public service has included being Special Assistant for Administration to Texas Governor William Clements, where he strengthened the scope and influence of the Governor's Committee for Disabled Persons. He served in the George H. W. Bush Administration as Assistant Secretary for Veterans Liaison and program coordination at the US Department of Veterans Affairs.

Since his retirement in 2005 as Public Affairs director for the VA, North Texas Health Care System in Dallas, Captain Clark has been involved in outreach efforts to help active-duty military personnel and veterans recover from traumas of combat and their adverse wartime experiences through his lay ministry, Combat Faith. He has also published two books about his experiences.



Robert Rankin, #62 - Events


