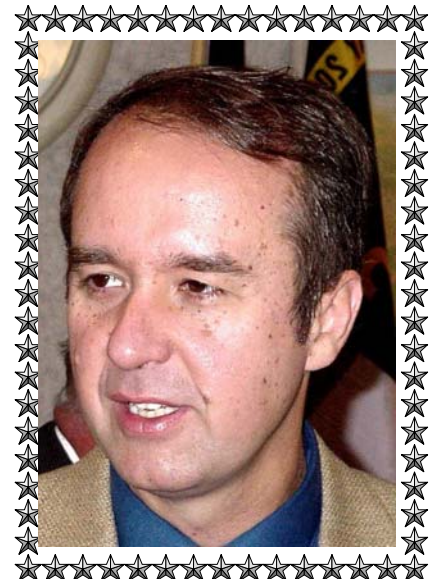

If an application is inadequate, it will be returned to the sponsor.

MEET YOUR CHAPTER OFFICERS

Newsletter Editor Dr. H. Charles Baker is descended from David Baker, a corporal from the Virginia Line in the "cannonade" under General George Washington in the Battles of White Plains, Trenton, Princeton, Bradywine, and Germantown. David's father, Thomas Baker, died when his powder magazine at his home in Culpepper, Virginia, exploded while he was making gunpowder for the patriots, and David's eight brothers and four sisters all fought or contributed to the cause of the Revolution. David's brother Richard was killed in the Battle of Trenton.

Charles received his Ph.D. in Electrical Engineering from the University of Texas (Austin) and teaches telecommunications courses in the S.M.U. Electrical Engineering Department. His popular freshman course, Introduction to Modern Telecommunications, is taken by about half of all SMU students.

Charles married Barbara Anne Allen, a descendent of Patriot Jones Broach who served in the North Carolina Line.

Charles and Barbara have two daughters: Jennifer is the Children's Librarian at Lewisville Public Library, and Rachel is a schoolteacher.
