

he Grand Union Flag, also called the Great Union Flag, or Cambridge Flag, was first raised over the Continental Army on January 1, 1776, near Cambridge, MA.



Being a full six months before our new nation severed ties with Great Britain, it contained the Union Jack so as not to unduly offend the British crown. This was our flag until replaced by the Stars & Stripes by the Flag Act of June 14, 1777.
