The North Texas Color Guard, seen at right below, followed the Scouts. After the Lake Highlands Parade, the group scurried over to merge with the Park Cities Parade at Preston Road and University, ending at Goar Park.

# Answers to last month's Americanism Trivia Quiz

- 1. William Keith was a Pennsylvania landowner who provided lodging for General Washington for nearly two weeks in his Valley Forge home while Washington planned the Battle of Trenton. His descendent is Jim Templin, a member of the Dallas Chapter of SAR.
- 2. John Hancock's wealth helped to earn him the position of President of the Continental Congress. In 1776, he was perhaps the wealthiest man in New England, and he financed many projects of the Revolutionary War.
- 3. The U.S. Declaration of Independence lists 27 grievances against the King of England.
- 4. The Bedford Cavalry Flag was carried to the Concord Bridge by Nathaniel Page, a Bedford Militiaman, making this flag the first flag under which blood was shed in the Revolutionary War.
