

Elected Representation

Revolution was a revolution of *ideas* — the war was a *result* of that revolution. The first idea was that all men are created equal. This radical concept flew in the face of the ancient idea of monarchy and paved the way for even more radicalism.

The second idea was that of Elected Representation. The word *Democracy* comes from the Greek *dēmos* (people), and *kratos* (rule); i.e., rule by the people. *Encyclopedia Britannica*, says that "democracy is a form of government in which the right to make political decisions is exercised directly by the whole body of citizens, acting under procedures of majority rule."

In the history of governments, few true democracies have survived. In a true democracy, the citizens gather to vote on every issue. Switzerland is a present-day example of a government that comes close to this ideal. Sovereign power rests with the Swiss people, who vote on proposed legislation several times a year.

In a country as large and diverse as the U.S., the gathering of citizens to vote on every issue is inconvenient if not impossible. We are not a democracy but a republic, in which we elect officials to make decisions on our behalf. This concept is ingrained at all levels of government, plus school systems, shareholder corporations, churches, organizations, etc.

President Abraham Lincoln once raised the question as to whether *any* nation conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal can long endure. I believe that the United States has become strong and successful because our Founding Fathers were driven by a sense of Divine guidance and an altruistic attitude; i.e., unselfish interest in the welfare of others and that of their posterity.

When greed, self-aggrandizement, back-biting, pork-barrel politics, and power brokering become the rule, not the exception, then the end of our Nation may be near.

Pray for America; pray that altruistic leaders will be elected to office and restore respect for government and for law.

Your Dallas Chapter Newsletter, "The Minuteman," is nearing a milestone. In July, 2000, we began publishing and mailing our black-and-white printed version in an all-digital format. At that time, we began posting the newsletter in a mixture of color and black-and-white photographs and graphics on the Worldwide Web at http://sardallas.com. Beginning with the June, 2002, issue, we went all-color for photographs and graphics.

Printing and mailing costs continue to increase to the point where the black-and-white printed version of "The Minuteman" now takes more than half of the Dallas Chapter's annual dues. This expense cuts into other expense items of the chapter, such as ROTC awards and cash prizes to winners of various youth contests that we run. The all-color web version costs almost nothing.

Approximately 99 per cent of attendees at the last three monthly meetings said that they have e-mail and web access. However, we have no idea concerning non-attendees' access to the Internet.

At the March 10, 2007 meeting of the Dallas Chapter, it was decided to collect email addresses of members and to determine who has web access. It was proposed that if the percentage of those having web access is high enough, we will send the black-and-white newsletter only to those who do not have web access. A final vote will be taken at the May meeting of the Dallas Chapter, before the next issue is published.

You will find a brief questionnaire inserted at right. Please fill it out and return it immediately. Our plan, assuming affirmative vote, is that all members of the Chapter who have e-mail addresses will receive an e-mail reminder whenever new issues are published on the web. Members without web access will continue to receive the black-and-white printed version.


