



The Other Nine Bullets

The February Issue pointed out that these radical ideas had their roots in the surge of literacy in England that was brought on by William the Conqueror in the 11th Century. The April Issue discussed the development of the concept of elected representation.

Our Declaration of Independence lists eighteen specific grievances against King George III of Great Britain. My June message highlighted the first nine grievances, all of which had to do with the fact that the colonists could not make and enforce their own local laws.

The other nine grievances were:

- "He has erected a multitude of New Offices and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat their substance."
- "He has kept among us ... Standing Armies ... without [our] Consent."
- "He has [made] the Military independent of and superior to Civil power."
- "He has [subjected] us to a jurisdiction foreign to [us] and unacknowledged by our laws; giving Assent to their Acts of... Legislation." Under this bullet are nine examples of such legislation, including quartering troops, blocking trade, releasing those who murder our people, imposing taxes without our consent, depriving Trial by Jury, suspending our legislatures, and abolishing our laws.
- "He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us."
- "He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people."
- "He is [transporting] Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation and tyranny, ... with circumstances of Cruelty ... totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation."
- "He has [forced] our fellow citizens taken captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to [be] executioners of their friends"
- "He has excited domestic insurrections against us and [brought to] our frontiers the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions."

In summary, the ultimate idea of the American Revolution of Ideas is that the monarch is not god, and that all men are created equal.

hown below is the new)41¢ U.S. Postage stamp honoring the 400th Anniversary of the Settlement of Jamestown in 1607. The unusual triangular shape of this stamp matches that of the town. Careful examination picture clearly of the reveals on the forward English mast the flag which still today features the Cross of St. George, a horizontal red cross on a white background. On the main mast is the flag "Kinas known as the Colors," a combination of the Cross of St. George and the Cross of St. (the Flag Andrew Scotland), a diagonal white cross on a navy blue background. The combination of England and Scotland represented the Island of Great Britain.
