### Roll out those lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer . . .

Nat King Cole sang those lyrics in 1963. To many Amer-

icans those lyrics reflect what summer should be - a time for rest and relaxation. Yet to us in the Sons of the American Revolution, summer is not a restful time. Between May and September we celebrate the sacrifices made by members of the armed forces on Memorial Day, the adoption of a design for our flag on June 14, the adoption of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, and the adoption of our Constitution in September. During that time we have our national congress and a state board of managers meeting.

When you look at the Revolutionary War, a significant portion of it was a warm weather war. This is not to say that there were not large scale military activities during winter months, but a number of major campaigns and battles occurred between April and October. Both sides bunkered down in the winter. In the winter food was scarce. In a pre-industrial agrarian society, food was local, and food was seasonal. During the growing season an army could live off the land by foraging, but during winter it dug in to conserve its resources.

Although we are finishing a cycle of presentations — Bronze Good Citizenship and ROTC medals, our activities do not stop there. As I write this, the Color Guard has three events on Memorial Day and at least three on the Fourth of July. Just because they are Color Guard activities does not mean that if you don't have Revolutionary War attire you cannot participate. You can come out to cheer the Color Guard on, or get an official shirt from the SAR Merchandise Department and march along. Those who choose to march in uniform are just one aspect of our public perception, but each of us can do our part to enhance public awareness of SAR. Even wearing the rosette that you received when you joined SAR can spark a conversation about its significance and guite possibly lead to a new member. With each new member the chapter and the state and national societies are that much stronger.

Our chapter does not go dark during the summer, nor should we individually slacken our efforts to keep the . memory and example of our patriot ancestors alive.
