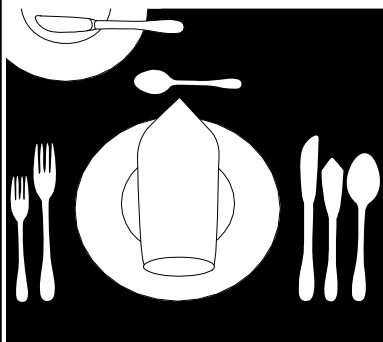
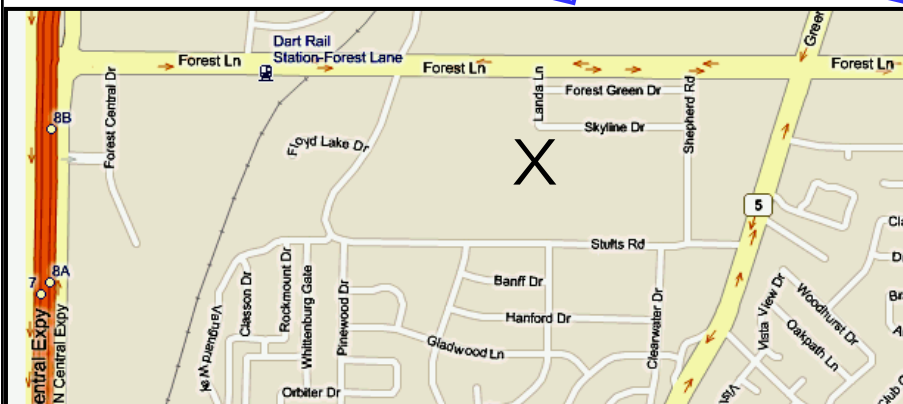

Park to the left in "Resident Parking." Enter the front door of the main building.

1. Who invented the one-man submarine (called the *Turtle*)? David Bushnell
2. Was the attack of the *Turtle* on the British man-of-war *Asia* successful? No. Sgt. Ezra Lee made the attempt but was unable to drill through the copper hull and was forced to withdraw.
3. In the Battle of Trenton, why did Col. Charles Scott tell his men to fire at the legs of the Hessians? Because each man wounded in the leg would require two men to carry him off the battlefield.
4. What future American president was wounded in the Battle of Trenton? James Munroe was one of the very few patriots wounded in the Battle of Trenton.
5. Who was the only Patriot of the American Revolution to sign all four documents: The Continental Association of 1774, the Declaration of Independence, the Articles of Confederation, and the U.S. Constitution? Roger Sherman. He was an elected member of the U.S. House of Representatives. At the time of his death of typhoid in 1793, he was both the mayor of New Haven, CT and an elected member of the U.S. Senate.

1. Name one of the two patriots who froze to death during the night of the crossing of the Delaware River prior to the Battle of Trenton. Hint: His brother is the patriot ancestor of the editor of this publication.

3. Writing of the Battle of Trenton, what historian wrote, "Yet it may be doubted whether so small a number of men ever employed so short a space of time with greater or more lasting results upon the history of the world"?

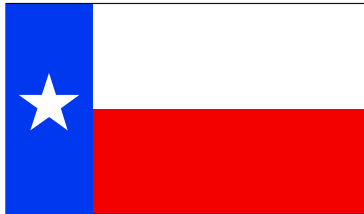
