COLOR GUARD! POST THE COLORS!

On September 8, 2021, an “in-person” Oath of Allegiance ceremony for new American citizens was held at the Grapevine Botanical Gardens in Grapevine, Texas. The ceremony was hosted by the Captain Molly Corbin Chapter of the Texas Daughters of the American Revolution in conjunction with the U. S. Customs and Immigration Service.

What is significant about this event? This is the first public event in north Texas recognizing newly naturalized American citizens since COVID restrictions were imposed approximately eighteen months ago.



The Captain Molly Corbin chapter reached out to the Major K M Van Zandt SAR Chapter in Fort Worth to provide an appropriate color guard for the event. Four members of the color guard responded to this event: Ron Turner, James Alderman, Van Cunningham, and Bobby Gresham.

Approximately 21 new American citizens appeared at this ceremony. They came from around the world ... from Russia, India, Brazil, Canada, Kenya, and Mexico, just to mention a few.

The colors were posted by the Major K M Van Zandt color guard. U. S. Chief District Judge Barbara M. G. Lynn administered the Oath of Allegiance to the attendees. Judge Lynn mentioned during her speech that she too is the off spring of immigrants noting that her own grandparents immigrated from Russia many years earlier.

2022 DUES NOTICES

You should receive your 2022 Dues Invoice within the next week or two at your home mail box as long as you have a deliverable address on file with the Texas Society.. Keep in mind that your dues are considered late on January 1, 2022. If they are still unpaid 30 days later - NSSAR will drop you from the roles and you will start to show a gap in your service and not get your magazine. So please pay them online or by mail as soon as you can to help our chapter and avoid a lapse in your SAR Service! As in previous years, you have 3 options for paying your dues.

Online/Paypal (option 1) - The Texas Society encourages everyone to use this option, and pay your dues by credit card through PayPal. You would need to go to the TexasSAR.org website site and enter your National SAR # and Name as it appears on your Membership Certificate. Then, select your primary chapter and any others you maintain dual membership with and follow the checkout procedures. Here is the link <https://www.txssar.org/dues.htm>.

US Mail (option 2) - You simply take the bottom section of the form you receive in the mail and send a check for the amount indicated with the pre-addressed envelope, stamp it and return it to us by US mail. You will notice this invoice has been modified again and cleaned up this year with some useful information on it - all 3 sections have similar information. As we did last year, we now consider this to be your PRIMARY Chapter Dues Statements - it only includes dues for your Primary Chapter, State Dues, and National Dues where applicable.

US Mail (option 3) - Use this option if you want to pay by check, but did NOT get a dues notice in the mail or want to pay NOW for whatever reason. You would need to go to the TexasSAR.org private website and grab your dues notice online and print it out and mail it back in with a check. This option is available NOW on the TexasSAR.org website. LIFE/PERPETUAL MEMBERSHIP IN SAR

Texas SAR Perpetual Membership pays National, State, and Chapter dues for life. National and State dues are paid at the rate in effect each year even if they are increased. Chapter dues are paid at the rate of \$9.50.

The rate is based on the age of the applicant and is twice the National Life Membership Plan cost. The National Life Membership Rates may be found on the [Application for Enrollment in the NSSAR National Life Membership Plan form](#). Your Texas SAR Perpetual Membership Rate can be automatically calculated for you on the [Fee Calculator](#) page.

A Texas SAR Perpetual Membership may be purchased in two equal installments. The first installment will be used by the Texas SAR Treasurer to purchase a National Life Membership for the Applicant. The Applicant would be required to pay State and Chapter dues until the second installment is paid. After the second installment is paid, the Applicant would not be required to pay future State or Chapter dues.

Compatriots wishing to purchase a Texas SAR Perpetual Membership should complete the National Life Membership Plan form and send the completed form and payment to the [Texas SAR Treasurer](#).

LOOKING FOR TAX-EXEMPT CONTRIBUTIONS?

As the end of 2022 approaches, you may be looking for ways to make contributions for tax purposes. Do you know that the chapter has two tax-exempt accounts that you should consider?

First, the Pray TCU Awards program was established in cooperation with the TCU History Department to recognize history students who have distinguished themselves in some patriotic fashion as set forth in the objectives of the Sons of the American Revolution Society. It is presented annually at the Spring Banquet of the TCU History Department and includes a cash award of not less than \$1,000. Candidates for the award are proposed by the TCU History Department, and final selection is made by the Chapter. The candidate must also be an American Citizen.

Second, the Goodman Youth Fund is used to assist the Chapter in administering the elementary and secondary students' programs of the Chapter. Members of the Chapter and others are encouraged to make provision in your estate planning to make contributions to the fund. The fund is also authorized to accept funds from other individuals, corporations, labor unions, businesses, and foundations. Additionally, members are encouraged to specify contributions to the Youth Fund instead of flowers as a memorial.

As of our September chapter meeting, the Pray TCU Award fund was \$1,964.53 and the Goodman Youth Fund was \$1,842.84. Both of these funds are in need of additional funds on an on-going basis.

So, if you are in search of ways to donate money at year-end for tax purposes, consider either or both of these chapter funds.

Bob Cochrane Inducted into SAR

At the September chapter meeting, President Ron Turner inducted Robert Donald Cochrane into the SAR. Chapter Registrar Gerry Gieger assisted by pinning the SAR Rosette on Compatriot Cochrane's shirt collar. Bob was accompanied by his lovely wife, Pam.

Bob joined the SAR based on the service of his 5th great-grandfather, Thomas King, who entered the Service of the United States in August 1776 as a private in Paxton County, Pennsylvania. He moved to Sullivan County, North Carolina, in 1777 where he enlisted in August 1778 to guard the frontier against the Shawnee Indians. In 1779, he volunteered to go to Kentucky where he assisted in building a fort which was taken in the spring by the British and Indians. He again enlisted in 1780 and fought in battles against the Cherokee Indians. In 1781, he substituted in Sullivan County, North Carolina (now Tennessee) and fought under General Francis Marion.

Thomas was born 17 Mar 1754 in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. He married Susan Sharp in 1783 in Sullivan County, Tennessee. He died 18 Jun 1847 in Sullivan County, Tennessee, and is buried in New Bethel Cemetery in Piney Flats, Sullivan County, Tennessee. His grave is marked by the Kings Mountain Chapter of the Tennessee Society SAR. Thomas and Susan were the parents of eight children.

MEDAL OF HONOR PARADE TEXAS SOCIETY COLOR GUARD GAINESVILLE, TEXAS SEPTEMBER 25, 2021

On a clear and warm Saturday morning, the Texas Society Color Guard gathered in Gainesville, Texas, a North Texas city situated on the Texas-Oklahoma state boundary, to pay respects to Medal of Honor (MOH) awardees. The Color Guard marched in the parade that honors these great national heroes. For 2021, twenty MOH awardees were scheduled to attend.

As is customary for the Texas Color Guard, Compatriots stood at attention, in a Present Arms attitude, as MOH awardees passed by our assembly area.

The Color Guard was comprised of two units: marching and riding. By the time the parade kicked-off at 10:00 a.m., Approximately 31 Compatriots comprised the marching unit, while ten Compatriots rode on the Color Guard trailer/float.



Bringing up the rear was the Color Guard trailer with various Revolutionary War flags adorning the trailer center and with Compatriots sitting on both sides.

The crowds along the mile-long parade route through Downtown Gainesville was boisterous and appeared to be very appreciative of the participation by the Texas Society Color Guard.

All Compatriots carried bottles of water or other liquid refreshment in order to stay hydrated properly on a very warm day.

For the first time ever, the Medal of Honor Parade was elevated to a national color guard event and this was reflected in the larger than normal numbers of Compatriots participating in the parade. For many, this was their first year to participate in the MOH Parade.

At the conclusion of the festivities, the Color Guard retired for a delightful BBQ lunch and fellowship.

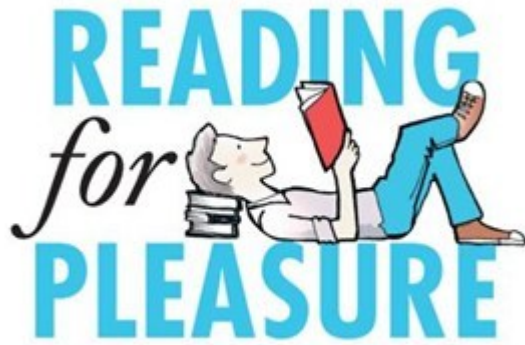

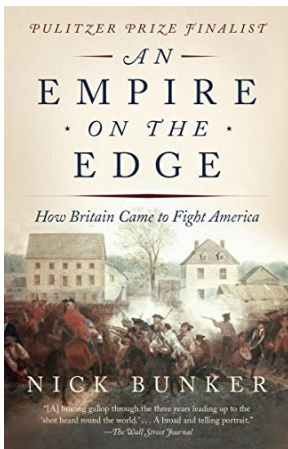

AN EMPIRE ON THE EDGE: HOW BRITAIN CAME TO FIGHT AMERICA

Written from a strikingly fresh perspective, this new account of the Boston Tea Party and the origins of the American Revolution shows how a lethal blend of politics, personalities, and economics led to a war that few people welcomed but nobody could prevent.

In this powerful but fair-minded narrative, British author Nick Bunker tells the story of the last three years of mutual embitterment that preceded the outbreak of America's war for independence in 1775. It was a tragedy of errors, in which both sides shared responsibility for a conflict that cost the lives of at least twenty thousand Britons and a still larger number of Americans. The British and the colonists failed to see how swiftly they were drifting toward violence until the process had gone beyond the point of no return.

At the heart of the book lies the Boston Tea Party, an event that arose from fundamental flaws in the way the British managed their affairs. By the early 1770s, Great Britain had become a nation addicted to financial speculation, led by a political elite beset by internal rivalry and increasingly baffled by a changing world. When the East India Company came close to collapse, it patched together a rescue plan whose disastrous side effect was the destruction of the tea.

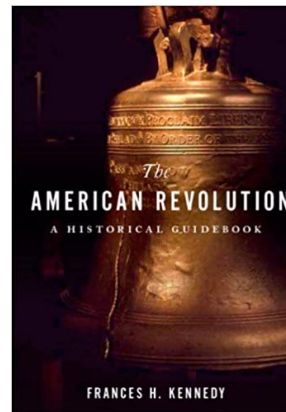
With lawyers in London calling the Tea Party treason, and with hawks in Parliament crying out for revenge, the

British opted for punitive reprisals without foreseeing the resistance they would arouse. For their part, Americans underestimated Britain's determination not to give way. By the late summer of 1774, when the rebels in New England began to arm themselves, the descent into war had become irreversible.

Drawing on careful study of primary sources from Britain and the United States, *An Empire on the Edge* sheds new light on the Tea Party's origins and on the roles of such familiar characters as Benjamin Franklin, John Hancock, and Thomas Hutchinson. The book shows how the king's chief minister, Lord North, found himself driven down the road to bloodshed. At his side was Lord Dartmouth, the colonial secretary, an evangelical Christian renowned for his benevolence. In a story filled with painful ironies, perhaps the saddest was this: that Dartmouth, a man who loved peace, had to write the dispatch that sent the British army out to fight.



THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION: A HISTORICAL GUIDEBOOK

In 1996, Congress commissioned the National Park Service to compile a list of sites and landmarks connected with the American Revolution that it deemed vital to preserve for future generations. Some of these sites are well known--Bunker Hill, Valley Forge, Fort Ticonderoga--and in no danger of being lost; others less so-- Blackstock's Plantation in South Carolina or Bryan's Station in Kentucky--and more vulnerable. But all are central to the story of our nation's fight for independence. From battlefields to encampments, meeting houses to museums, these places offer us a chance to rediscover the remarkable men and women who founded this nation and to recognize the relevance of not just what they did, but where they did it.



VAN ZANDT FAMILY MEMBER VISITS CHAPTER

The American Revolution: A Historical Guidebook takes readers to nearly 150 of these sites, providing an overview of the Revolution through an exploration of the places where American independence was articulated, fought for, and eventually secured. Beginning with the Boston Common, first occupied by British troops in 1768, and closing with Fraunces Tavern in New York, where George Washington bid farewell to his officers on December 4, 1783, Kennedy takes readers on a tour of the most significant places of Revolutionary history. Accompanied by illuminating excerpts and essays from some of the foremost scholars in the field, including David McCullough, Barbara Tuchman, David Hackett Fischer, Eric Foner, and John Ferling, the entries move in a roughly chronological order from the pre-Revolutionary years up through 1787. Taken together, the combination of site, essay, and excerpt provides rich context and overview, giving a sense of the major figures and events as well as the course of the Revolution, and cover topics ranging from the Boston Tea Party to the frontier wars.

The guide is encyclopedic in scope and covers a wide geographical sweep. Accompanied by historical maps, as well as a number of illuminating primary documents including the Declaration of Independence and letters from John Adams and George Washington, it offers a comprehensive picture of how the Revolutionary War unfolded on American soil, and also points readers to the best writing on the subject in the last fifty years. *The American Revolution: A Historical Guidebook* is an essential companion for anyone interested in the story and history of our nation's founding.

The Chapter was honored to welcome Troy Dow Van Zandt at our September chapter meeting. Troy is a member of the Tucson Chapter, Arizona Society, and was visiting in the Fort Worth area and joined us for our meeting.

Troy joined the SAR in 2019 and his patriot ancestor is Isaiah Van Sant (Van Zandt), who was born in 1733 in Pennsylvania, and died in 1789 in North Carolina. Troy is a distant cousin to our chapter's namesake, Major Khleber Miller Van Zandt. Their common ancestor goes another two generations back from Isaiah to Jacobus Van Sant, born 15 Feb 1685 in New York and died 9 Jan 1745 in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. Jacobus married Rebecca Vandergrift in 1707 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

President Turner extended a warm welcome to Com Patriot Van Zandt and invited him to join us anytime he is in the Fort Worth area.

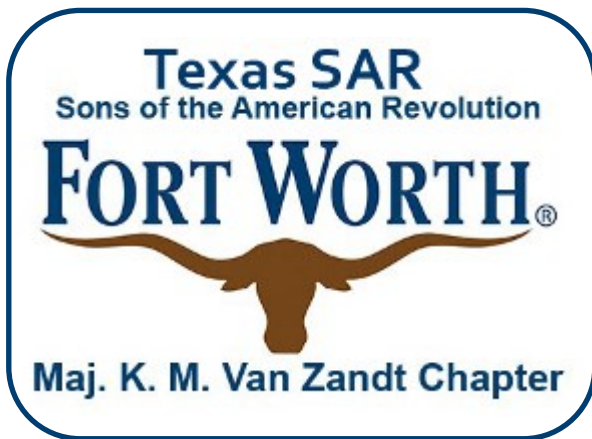
