Flag Display and Retirement

Compatriots,

June 14 is National Flag Day. SAR and DAR members should lead the way by example and display the national flag regularly, if not daily. I believe we should all have passing knowledge of the <u>US Flag Code</u>. Our color guard conducts flag presentations at area high schools when invited to do so. They display 8 or 10 flags flown during the American Revolution and talk about both the flags and the Revolution and touch on the principles of the founding fathers of our country. Here are a couple of photos from past presentations:





SAR chapters nationwide seek out individuals and businesses that regularly and properly display our national flag and that is something all chapter members can help. As you travel around the area, begin to notice homeowners and business locations that display our flag. Jot down the addresses and inform any member of our board. We will do the rest. What is the rest? We will contact the people and, if acceptable to them, we will create an SAR Flag Recognition Certificate and present that certificate with color guard members in uniform at their location. If the people prefer, we can simply mail them the certificate. Help us do this regularly by passing along location information. Our chapter conducts a **Flag Retirement Ceremony** annually at **Plano Fire Station 12—corner of Coit and Parker**. The ceremony teaches us about the flag, its origin and how to properly retire worn and tattered flags. Chapter Member Maj Gen Keith Thurgood acts as flag inspector and other chapter members take part in the event. John Rothermel is our bugler. I encourage all chapter members to attend on **Saturday June 15, 10:00 AM**. Finally let's all promote patriotism and honor our flag by flying one at our homes regularly.







The 80th Anniversary of D-Day: The Allied Invasion of Europe 6 June 1944

The Normandy landings were the landing operations and associated airborne operations on Tuesday, 6 June 1944 of the Allied invasion of Normandy in Operation Overlord during World War II. Codenamed Operation Neptune and often referred to as D-Day, it is the largest seaborne invasion in history. The operation began the liberation of France and the rest of Western Europe, and laid the foundations of the Allied victory on the Western Front.

Nine allied nations, consisting of over 150,000 troops, assembled on the beach that day. They were met with heavy resistance from German troops, who were waiting on top of nearby cliffs.

According to the National D-Day Memorial Foundation, 23,000 paratroopers from the U.S. and Great Britain were dropped by aircraft and gliders. More than 5,000 ships were also used to support the invasion, also called "Operation Overlord." By daylight, the beach was under Allied control.

Within the next five days, the Allies brought over 326,000 troops, 54,000 vehicles and 104,000 tons of supplies to the area for the military operation, according to the D-Day Museum & Overlord Embroidery.

Allied forces suffered nearly 10,000 casualties, and more than 4,000 were dead by the end of the battle.

D-Day has a special place for me personally. Although not taking part in the actual landings, my father supported the efforts and sacrifices of those who did participate in that operation. Joseph J. Bush was a Private in the Army serving in the 3093 Quartermaster Refrigeration Company. He was sent to Le Havre, France in September 1944, directly after the conclusion of Operation Astonia, which secured the port from German occupation. Le Havre was the most important port in Normandy and was critical to supplying the invading Allied forces. He was instrumental in supplying material for the reconstruction of the port, as well as participating in the supply line which fed the White Ball Express from Le Havre to Paris.

The Grave Marking of Martha "Patsey" Brockett Wakefield (Cont'd)

Martha "Patsey" Brockett was born 25 October 1797 in Smith County TN and died 7 June 1873 in Denton County TX. She was the youngest of 12 children born to *Captain William Ebenezer Brockett* and *Martha "Patsey" Ives*. She married *Henry Wakefield, Jr* in 1817. Henry was the son of *Henry Wakefield, Sr.* and *Mary Simpson*.

Martha's father is a DAR recognized patriot who served in South Carolina. Henry's father is a DAR recognized patriot who served in North Carolina. Henry's Grandfather, Charles Wakefield, is also a DAR recognized patriot for the supplies ha furnished.

The **Order of Ceremony** was conducted 27 April 2024 at 11:00 am at The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints located at 902 Chinn Chapel Rd, Highland Village TX and featured addresses from several local DAR Chapter Officers, Texas DAR State Regent Marcy Carter-Lovick and Denton County Commissioner Dianne Edmondson. **Posting of the Colors** was performed by the *Major KM Van Zandt Chapter, SAR*.

The group then adjourned to the **Chinn Chapel Cemetery** for the placing of the *Plaque* and *Wreath*.

TO ALL PLANO SAR CHAPTER MEMBERS WHO SERVED DURING THE VIETNAM WAR ERA:

The Department of Defense (DoD) has authorized any veterans who served anywhere and in any capacity during the Vietnam Era, Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 to be eligible to receive a **Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin (VVLP)**.

Pins have previously been awarded at scheduled group events, but the DoD has now made it possible for eligible veterans to request a pin be delivered to their home address. This program is open to all Veterans, not just our chapter members, so if you know of eligible veterans not in our chapter, feel free to notify them of the program. If eligible Veterans have not previously received a pin, here is how one can be ordered:

- 1. Veterans who served anywhere in any capacity during the period Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 are eligible to receive a pin.
- 2. Veterans can email whs.pentagon.wso.mbx.vnwar50th-cpp-events-application@mail.mil and a Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin will be sent to you via USPS. Please include a good mailing address including your city and state.

Regarding his Patriot Ancestor
Richard Inman

From the book "The Story of the Wyoming Valley" regarding the Battle of Wyoming - July 3, 1778, Luzerne county, Pennsylvania.

The incident known as Inman's nap has two or more versions. The most popular one is the following: "Richard Inman started with the Hanover company up the valley the day of the battle. At every house they stopped they imbibed liquid refreshments. Inman filled a bottle so that he could have something between visits. The old man could not carry his load, so he lay down. The battle was fought and lost and men were getting out of harm's way. Lazarus Butler was urging his horse along when he came upon Rufus Bennet, who was pursued by an Indian. Bennet caught on to the tail of the Colonel's horse, and away they went. The fleet footed savage had nearly overtaken them when Bennet saw Inman sitting up, rubbing his eyes. 'Shoot that Indian!' Bennet cried. The old hunter swung his rifle to his shoulder without getting up and dropped the Indian as quick as he had often shot a deer on the run.

Four of Richard Inman's brothers were in the battle; two were killed. One swam the river in his flight, and being overheated, died. Two much whiskey probably saved the life of Richard as well as that of Rufus Bennet. Another brother the next winter thought he heard the call of a wild turkey. He took his gun and went after it. The next spring his body was found scalped by the Indians that had deceived him. The Inmans became known as Indian killers and squared up with them with interest. One of the Inmans had notches in the stock of his rifle to tally the number he killed.

The Albany Congress

In 1754, the British government asked colonial representatives to meet in Albany, New York, to develop a treaty with Native Americans and plan the defense of the colonies against France. Exceeding these limited objectives, the assembly adopted a plan developed by Benjamin Franklin for government of the colonies by a central executive and a council of delegates.



Although rejected by England and the colonies, the Albany Plan became a useful guide in the years leading up to the Revolutionary War. The mural depicts some of the delegates (from left to right): William Franklin and his father, Benjamin (Pennsylvania); Governor Thomas Hutchinson (Massachusetts); Governor William Delancey (New York); Sir William Johnson (Massachusetts); Colonel Benjamin Tasker (Maryland).

The History Minute

"Cinco De Mayo and the US Civil War"





Duane discusses the real reasons behind the celebration of Cinco De Mayo and the political and economic connections it had with the United States, Europe and the Confederate States of America.

The Featured Speaker Presentation

"Red River Bridge War: A Texas-Oklahoma Border Battle"

Introduced by Melvin Richards, VP of Programs

Presented by Rusty Williams, noted author and journalist

At the beginning of America's Great Depression, Texas and Oklahoma armed up and went to war over a 75-cent toll bridge that connected their states across the Red River. It was a two-week affair marked by the presence of National Guardsmen with field artillery, Texas Rangers with itchy trigger fingers, angry mobs, Model T blockade runners, and even a costumed Native American peace delegation. Traffic backed up for miles, cutting off travel between the states. Rusty educates us on the background and causes of this conflict, as well as detailing the ramifications this conflict had, not only for the two states directly involved, but for the nation as a whole.
