




President's Message



Plano Fire Station 12 Flag Retirement Ceremony 15 June, 2024

On 15 June, the City of Plano, Plano Fire-Rescue and the Plano Chapter #37 Sons of the American Revolution conducted the annual June flag retirement ceremony. Provision has been made for proper retirement of unserviceable flags with dignity and respect. It's vitally important to remember that our servicemen and servicewomen have fought and died for this flag and the privilege to fly it to this day in representation of the freedoms that we all enjoy.

U.S. law allows a flag to be destroyed by fire if it is no longer in a condition to serve as a fitting emblem for display. Here's what happens during a flag retirement ceremony:

- 1 A worn and tattered flag is lowered to represent all of the flags being retired.
- 2 The flags are inspected and deemed unfit.
- 3 The stars are cut away and burned separately.
- 4 The stripes are burned.

TO ALL PLANO SAR CHAPTER MEMBERS WHO SERVED DURING THE VIETNAM WAR ERA:

The Department of Defense (DoD) has authorized any veterans who served anywhere and in any capacity during the Vietnam Era, Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 to be eligible to receive a **Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin (VVLP)**.

Pins have previously been awarded at scheduled group events, but the DoD has now made it possible for eligible veterans to request a pin be delivered to their home address. This program is open to all Veterans, not just our chapter members, so if you know of eligible veterans not in our chapter, feel free to notify them of the program. If eligible Veterans have not previously received a pin, here is how one can be ordered:

1. Veterans who served anywhere in any capacity during the period Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 are eligible to receive a pin.

2. Veterans can email <u>whs.pentagon.wso.mbx.vnwar50th-cpp-events-application@mail.mil</u> and a Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin will be sent to you via USPS. Please include a good mailing address including your city and state.




Patriot Stories

Contributed by Randall Bush Regarding his Patriot Ancestor William D Reeve

William D Reeve, the son of George Reeve (1730 - 1778), was born on 5 April, 1756 in Prince William
County Virginia. In the summer of 1776, William enlisted in Prince William County and served for three weeks as a Private in James Ewell's Company under Colonel Henry Lee's Virginia Regiment. In the fall of 1776, he again enlisted for three weeks and served as a Private in the same company and regiment. On 1 January, 1777, he enlisted in Fauquier County, Virginia and served for four months as a Private in Captain James Scott's Virginia Company under Colonels Hollingsworth and Stricker.
Private Reeve saw action in the Battle of Quibbletown, NJ on 8 February 1777. He then served for three weeks as a Lieutenant in Captain Evan's Virginia Company. In 1781, he served for three weeks as a Lieutenant in Captain Valentine Payton's Virginia Company.
Upon his discharge, Lieutenant Reeve was given land in Abbeville District, SC where he went to live. In 1840, he removed to DeKalb County, GA to live with his son, James White Reeve.
Lieutenant William Reeve passed on 14 March 1842 in DeKalb County, GA. He rests along with his wife, Arnetta, in the Nancy Creek Primitive Baptist Cemetery.



The Continental Navy

The United States Navy decided in 1971 to recognize October 13, 1775 as the date of its official establishment, the passage of the resolution of the Continental Congress at Philadelphia that created the Continental Navy. On this day, Congress authorized the purchase of two vessels to be armed for a cruise against British merchant ships; these ships became *Andrew Doria* and *Cabot*. The first ship in commission was *USS Alfred* which was purchased on November 4 and commissioned on December 3 by Captain Dudley Saltonstall.



Resolution of the Continental Congress that marked the establishment of what is now the United States Navy:

"Resolved, That a swift sailing vessel, to carry ten carriage guns, and a proportionable number of swivels, with eighty men, be fitted, with all possible despatch, for a cruise of three months, and that the commander be instructed to cruize eastward, for intercepting such transports as may be laden with warlike stores and other supplies for our enemies, and for such other purposes as the Congress shall direct.

That a Committee of three be appointed to prepare an estimate of the expence, and lay the same before the Congress, and to contract with proper persons to fit out the vessel.

Resolved, that another vessel be fitted out for the same purposes, and that the said committee report their opinion of a proper vessel, and also an estimate of the expence."

The History Minute

"The Committees of 1774"

Presented by Duane Carter, Registrar

Duane discusses how information was spread prior to the Revolution. This includes several newspapers and Committees of Correspondence. The British Government did not expect a unified response from the colonies, but the various committees kept the colonies informed and allowed a more unified position to be sent to London. Information about the ongoing Indian attacks were also sent throughout the colonies.

The Featured Speaker Presentation "Benjamin Franklin"

Introduced by Melvin Richards, VP of Programs

Presented by Bill Watts, Secretary and Color Guard Commander, Dallas Chapter SAR

Compatriot Watts portrayed Benjamin Franklin and discussed his early life.

Benjamin Franklin provided the principles he learned at the age of 20 that defined the rest of his life. He was born on January 17, 1706. He was a prolific reader. The principles were:

1. I must be extremely frugal until I am out of debt.

2. I will tell the truth, avoid creating unrealistic expectations and try to be sincere in every word and action.

3. I'll work hard in whatever business I find myself in and not be diverted by get-rich-quick schemes, because hard work and patience are the surest paths to success.

4. I will never speak ill of anyone.

He was apprenticed to his brother James, who published the *New England Courant*, when he was 12 years old. James was imprisoned for expressing his critical opinion in the paper on what the government was doing. In his absence, Franklin wrote a story about a fictitious person that expressed similar opinions without consequence. That success led to Franklin leaving his brother at age 17 to start anew in the printing business in Philadelphia. After a period of time learning the printing trade in London, he returned to Philadelphia in 1726. In 1728, he founded *The Pennsylvania Gazette*. In 1730, he entered into common-law marriage with Deborah Reed. She was an astute business women and managed his businesses and money. He also started helping others start their own printing business in exchange for a portion of their profits. That provided an income stream for the rest of his life. He swam almost every day for cleanliness and exercise.
