


President's Message

The SAR Freedom Chapter would like to announce an upcoming marker dedication at the historic <u>Gates-Perry Cemetery</u> located in Gates Crossing, a ranch community in Washington County, Texas. We will honor Revolutionary War **Patriot William Gates** who, as part of Stephen F. Austin's "Old Three Hundred," arrived in Texas in the early 1800s and settled in what is known today as Washington on the Brazos. The SAR Freedom Chapter and the DAR Coushatti Trace Chapter will be adding Patriot Grave Markers within the cemetery.

We will jointly host this dedication ceremony with the DAR for these markers on **November 16, 2024, at 1:30 p.m.** Formal invitations, including details, maps, parking information, and other logistics, will be posted on the <u>events calendar</u> in the coming week. TO ALL PLANO SAR CHAPTER MEMBERS

WHO SERVED DURING THE VIETNAM WAR ERA:

The Department of Defense (DoD) has authorized any veterans who served anywhere and in any capacity during the Vietnam Era, Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 to be eligible to receive a **Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin (VVLP)**.

Pins have previously been awarded at scheduled group events, but the DoD has now made it possible for eligible veterans to request a pin be delivered to their home address. This program is open to all Veterans, not just our chapter members, so if you know of eligible veterans not in our chapter, feel free to notify them of the program. If eligible Veterans have not previously received a pin, here is how one can be ordered:

1. Veterans who served anywhere in any capacity during the period Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 are eligible to receive a pin.

2. Veterans can email <u>whs.pentagon.wso.mbx.vnwar50th-cpp-events-application@mail.mil</u> and a Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin will be sent to you via USPS. Please include a good mailing address including your city and state.




Patriot Stories

Contributed by Ronald Carey Regarding his Patriot Ancestor John Pringle

John Pringle (cataloged by the DAR as John PRINDLE) and his brother Samuel were soldiers stationed at Ft. Pitt (now Pittsburgh) during the French and Indian war. They deserted their post with two others who were eventually captured but John & Samuel hid in the wilderness living off the land. History has them recorded as living in what is known as the "Pringle Tree" of Buckhannon, West Virginia. After the war was over and they realized they were no longer wanted, they returned to civilization. John was a pioneer of Louisville, Jefferson County, Kentucky while Samuel led a group of settlers to form a community named South Branch (of the Potomac river).

Both brothers are listed on page 639 of Virginians in the Revolution serving with the Kentucky Militia. John also provided supplies during the war as documented in George Rogers Clark papers 1781-1784. He married Rebecca Simpson and I am a direct descendent of their eldest daughter, Catharine.

The Battles of Saratoga: A Turning Point



September and October are important dates in the history of the American Revolution. In 1777 a major element of the British army numbering 7000 trained troops commanded by General John Burgoyne left Canada with the intention of capturing Albany and controlling New York and the New England colonies.

General Horatio Gates and his Continental Armies numbering over 12,000 troops were camped about 10 miles south of Saratoga. The two armies met in skirmishes almost daily from September 19 to October 7. General Gates knew General Burgoyne's supply line was exhausted and that no reinforcements were available to him. Gates pressed the battle and Burgoyne surrendered on October 17, 1777.

When news of this American victory reached France, King Louis XVI saw an opportunity to damage British control of the colonies. If the Continental Army could successfully defeat British regulars, they might win independence. King Louis XVI, on February 6, 1778, signed the Treaty of Alliance with the Continental army and the Colonial Government making France a decisive ally to the Americans in their fight for independence.

The History Minute "The First Continental Congress"



Presented by Duane Carter, Registrar

The first Continental Congress met 250 years ago this month. Duane unfolds how representatives of twelve of the thirteen colonies met for the first time to address complaints by Massachusetts against the British Government as stated in the Suffolk Resolutions. The primary cause of the disputes against the British were trade relations. Retaliatory actions by the British Government and the overt involvement of the East India Company caused much consternation. The Congress made a firm start toward resistance against these actions by introducing a trade embargo against Britian.

The Featured Speaker Presentation

"Religion in the English Colonies and the Early American Republic: The Great Awakening"

Introduced by Melvin Richards, VP of Programs

Presented by Randall Bush, Secretary

Randall discusses how the Great Awakening, a series of spiritual revivals occuring in Europe and North America, affected the attitudes and actions of, first the early Colonists, then the citizens of the new Republic of the United States. Beginning in the 1730s, a sea change of religious thinking was beginning to appear by means of the preaching of men such as Solomon Stoddard, Jonathan Edwards and George Whitefield. The effects of this approach was to build in the subsequent generations of Colonists the concepts of self-determination, individualism and independence that blurred the boundaries of the social classes. The Second Great Awakening resulted in the establishment of many colleges and seminaries, along with the "camp-meeting" form of revivals.
