# State of the Chapter Address (Cont'd)

As just reported, we are a chapter of 134 members, active in our community as stated in the SAR Mission Statement:

#### Among the highlights of our just completed year are these:

#### **Veterans Activities incl WaA:**

- Our chapter bought lap blankets for 100 veterans temporarily residing at the Bonham V A Clinic. Members of our chapter worked at veterans events at Bonham for the Veterans Day cookout and for the Christmas gift party.
- Our chapter purchased over 400 wreaths to be placed on veterans gravesites form this year's Wreaths Across America event, and 7 of our chapter members volunteered as honorary wreath bearers, as chaplain and as bugler for the event at the Pecan Grove Cemetery in McKinney. All of these purchases made possible by chapter member's donations at chapter meetings.

#### **Youth Patriotic Competitions and Awards:**

 Alan Roach and his team awarded one cash prize for the winner of the SAR Poster contest, 15 Bronze JROTC award medals and 16 JROTC recognition certificates to high school students.

#### **Chapter Awards:**

 We awarded chapter members with 2 Special Awards 1 to Howard Roach, 1 to Tracy Curtin, made 2 color guard promotions, and issued 10 Certificates of Appreciation.

# What America Needed That 1776 Christmas: Leadership

Those of us blessed to live in this land of the free and home of the brave allow most Christmases to pass without remembering one of the most important events in American history: George Washington's heroics on December 25, 1776, and the days that followed, that proved to be the tipping point toward victory in the Revolutionary War.

Because of Big George's Christmas Day leadership, we gained "the sacred fire of liberty" and "republican model of government" (words from his first inaugural address in 1789) that have served us so well for so long.

Shortly after the Declaration of Independence was signed in July 1776, America's military effort appeared doomed to fail after defeat at the Battle of Brooklyn in August, the taking of Fort Washington on Manhattan Island in November, and the subsequent retreat through New Jersey.

Hopes for success were dying and colonial soldiers counted the days until their service commitments expired at year's end.

The situation drove Washington to acknowledge in a December 10th letter, "One's imagination can scarce extend to a situation more distressing than mine. Our only dependence now is upon the speedy enlistment of a new army. If this fails, I think the game will be pretty well up."

In his book 1776, David Mccullough wrote that soon after that moment, General Nathaniel Greene observed that his boss, "never appeared to so much advantage as in the hour of distress."

Washington wrote to a friend about the prospect of his having a "brilliant stroke" that might save the cause.

A few days later, he predicted landing "a lucky blow against the enemy that would most certainly rouse the spirits of the people, who are quite sunk by our misfortunes".

Washington proceeded to devise and execute the "brilliant stroke" and "lucky blow" plan that changed the course of the war.

It started on Christmas night. Thinking the enemy would be relaxed that holiday evening at their garrison in Trenton NJ, Washington planned to have his men, horses and cannons depart from their camp in Pennsylvania and cross the nearby Delaware River in flat bottom boats normally used to transport pig iron. Upon reaching the other side, they would then march the ten miles to their destination.

The plan went forward that night despite a gathering storm and the river's being filled with broken sheets of ice. His password for the daring venture - Victory or Death - Aligned with his orders: "No man to quit his ranks on pain of death." To inspire his troops before they left camp, Washington had a passage from Thomas Paine read aloud: "These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands it now deserves the love and thanks of all people."

As the men got in the boats to cross the river, the storm hit. One soldiers description: "It rained, hailed, snowed, and froze, and at the same time blew a perfect hurricane."

Chernow believed "Crossing the Delaware on Christmas night, Washington knew, would produce either storied success or utter calamity, and he was ready to pay the price... With the country's future riding on his shoulders, he displayed indomitable tenacity. If the raid backfired, the war was likely over and he would be captured and killed."

The ice slowed the paddle and pole-driven boats and those who made it didn't get across the river until 3:00 AM, putting them three hours behind schedule.

Before their departure, Washington divided his men into three separate regiments meant to land at three different places on the banks of the Delaware, but two of the groups never made it across the river.

Regardless of the storm delay and manpower reduction, Washington knew retreat was impossible. "I was determined to push on at all events," he wrote.

The march toward Trenton was made by the remaining 2,400 men over steeply-sloped rain slicked terrain and in weather so severe two of them froze to death.

The commander-in-chief rode up and down the rows of his drenched and freezing soldiers, keeping them focused on the challenge at hand. Upon reaching their destination, many of the men's guns were so rain-soaked they couldn't fire. Washington's Plan B command: "Use the Bayonet."

An hour after daylight, with the storm still raging, the attack began. It lasted about 45 minutes. Despite their fatigue and lack of firepower, Washington said every American soldier "vied with the other for pressing forward." The result: The enemy had 21 soldiers killed, 90 wounded, 900 taken prisoner, and 500 escaped, while the Americans suffered only 4 wounded (one being future President James Monroe) and no one killed.

After the battle, Washington delivered a glowing message to his men, thanking them for "their spirited and gallant" effort, since he had "not seen a single instance of bad behavior in either officers or privates."

He told Major James Wilkinson, "This is a glorious day for our country." In fact, it proved to be the day that saved our country.

When news of the victory at Trenton arrived at the Continental Congress, John Hancock could see that, although had been achieved by men broken by fatigue and ill-fortune, Washington's leadership deserved credit: "Troops properly inspired and animated by a just confidence in their leader will often exceed expectations. As it is entirely to your wisdom and conduct, the United States are indebted for the success of your arms."

Four days after their victory, Washington succeeded in persuading his troops to renew their military service commitment into the new year . When they did, General Greene decided it was "God Almighty who inclined their hearts to listen to the proposal and they engaged anew." Additional men soon volunteered and by August 1777, the Army's size had grown to 12,000.

Washington led his troops to another triumph In early January at the Battle of Princeton.

McCullough drew this conclusion about the back-to-back victories: "As thrilling as the news of Princeton was for the country, coming so quickly after the triumph at Trenton, it was Trenton that meant the most. Trenton and the night crossing of the Delaware were rightly seen as a great turning point. With that victory came the realization that Americans had bested the enemy, outsmarted them and out fought them, and so might well again."

On Christmas night 1776, George Washington kept our Continental Army "spirited and gallant" in its darkest hours, and thereby delivered the "brilliant stroke" and "lucky blow" needed for America to obtain her independence from England.

At Christmas 2024, many of us with our bellies full, homes warm and stockings filled, in the greatest country in the world, let's take a minute to give thanks for our first president and that first American Christmas.

# The Joseph S Rumbaugh Oration Contest and Scholarship

Dear Compatriots,

I'm reaching out to you regarding the Joseph S. Rumbaugh Historical Oration Contest and Scholarship. You are receiving this email because your chapter is located in Area 4. I represent Area 4, which is the area from Dallas east, in the state S.A.R. oration competition. It is my job to recruit local students for the oration contest. This is an excellent scholarship opportunity for high school students who are active in speech, debate, theater, ROTC or have an interest in history.

I need your help. If you have any children, grandchildren or other acquaintances who are high school students please pass along the contest information. If you have a spouse who is involved in DAR please have them share the attached documents with their chapter.

The contest is open to all high school students, boys and girls, grades 9-12. At the state level first place receives a \$2500 scholarship; 2nd - \$750; 3rd place - \$500; 4th place - \$300; 5th and 6th places \$150 each. The top state winners will compete at the National S.A.R. convention for a chance to win a \$6000 scholarship; 2nd - \$4000; and 3rd - \$2000; with places 4-6 receiving \$500 each.

Participants must write an original oration of not less than five minutes, or more than six minutes. The oration must be delivered from memory and without the use of notes or any kind of props. "The subject of the oration shall deal with an event, a personality, or a document pertaining to the Revolutionary War with an emphasis on our nation's 250th anniversary celebration. It is essential that each oration show the relationship it bears to America today. Evidence of historical research and creative presentation are also important. The oration will be judged based upon its composition, delivery, significance, historical accuracy and relevance to our 250th anniversary." Note: there is a slight discrepancy regarding the subject of the oration between the national and Texas state websites. The national website is correct and has been stated in quotations above.

Students could potentially earn up to \$8500 in scholarships at the chapter, state and national levels. The Texas S.A.R. president encourages students to take their written orations and submit them to the S.A.R. essay contest for an additional scholarship opportunity.

Even if a student doesn't finish first it is an excellent opportunity to add to their college application. If a student does not make it to the state contest we try to fill slots at chapter levels for local scholarships. Also, local chapters often provide a small scholarship to chapter winner. This is at the discretion of each chapter.

#### 1) Name the three Wise Men and name the 3 gifts to the baby Jesus.

**A.** Balthasar, Melchior, Caspar (or Gaspar) - Interestingly the Bible does not states state their names, nor even the number of wise men: "...there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem... and when they had opened their treasures, they presented unto him gifts; gold, and frankincense and myrrh..." from Matthew 2:1 and 2:11.

#### 2) What are the gifts in the Twelve Days of Christmas?

A) The "Twelve Days of Christmas" was originally written to help Catholic children, in England, remember different articles of faith during the persecution by Protestant Monarchs. The "true love" represented God, and the gifts all different ideas:

- 1. The "Partridge in a pear tree" was Christ.
- 2. Turtle Doves = The Old and New Testaments
- 3. French Hens = Faith, Hope and Charity-- the Theological Virtues
- 4. Four Calling Birds = The Four Gospels
- 5. Five Gold Rings = The First Five Books of the Old Testament
- 6. Six Geese A-laying = The Six Days of Creation
- 7. Seven Swans A-swimming = The Sevenfold Gifts of the Spirit
- 8. Eight Maids A-milking = The Beatitudes
- 9. Nine Ladies Dancing = The Nine Fruits of the Spirit
- 10. Ten Lords A-leaping = The Ten Commandments
- 11. Eleven Pipers Piping = The Eleven Faithful Disciples
- 12. Twelve Drummers Drumming = The Twelve Points of Belief in the Apostle's Creed

- 5) Who wrote "A Christmas Carol"?
  - A) Charles Dickens Dec 1845
- 6) In what modern country was the real St Nicholas born?
  - A) Turkey--St Nicholas, bishop 'Nikolaos of Myra', 270-343 AD, Where the ancient town of Myra stood, now stands the Turkish town Demre, Antalya Province, Turkey). It was the Dutch who first made him into a Christmas gift-giver, and Dutch settlers brought him to America where his name eventually became the familiar Santa Claus.

#### 7) Who started the tradition of Santa Claus dressed in red?

A) Present-day Santa owes his red robe, not to an ancient legend or to an early myth, but to the Coca Cola Company. Around 1930, Coca-Cola decided to use the image of Santa Claus in its winter advertising campaign and took on an American artist called Haddon Sundblom. Sundblom chose the official Coca Cola colors -red and white- and designed a loose tunic fastened by a tight black belt. When Sundblom's campaign was over, Santa's image in a red robe had become popular all over the world. Prior to that, Santa had many different looks in many countries.

#### 8) Name Santa Claus's reindeer, not including Rudolph.

A) Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Dunder (variously spelled Donder and Donner), and Blitzen or Blixen.

#### 9) Are Santa's reindeer male, female or mixed?

A) Undetermined. Both male and female reindeer or caribou grow antlers -- a trait unique in the deer family -- although male reindeer antlers grow larger than female caribou antlers, we know that Santa's reindeer probably aren't males, because mature male reindeer lose their antlers by December after the mating season, and Christmas reindeer are always depicted with their antlers. Females retain their antler longer. That means Santa's sled either is pulled by young male reindeer still with antlers or else Santa's reindeer are all female.

#### 10) Who is credited with creating the first nativity scene or crèche?

A) Saint Francis of Assisi is credited with creating the first nativity scene in 1223 (a "living" one) intending thereby to cultivate the worship of Christ, having been inspired by his recent visit to the Holy Land where he had been shown Jesus's traditional birthplace.

#### 11) When and where was Christmas banned?

A) Christmas was banned in England in 1647 by the Puritan-led Parliament, which viewed the holiday as a pagan festival associated with excess and immorality. The ban lasted until the monarchy was restored in 1660.

#### 12) To what country do we trace the modern Christmas Tree?

A) The custom of the Christmas tree developed in early modern Germany in which "devout Christians brought decorated trees into their homes". Trees that remained green all year had a special meaning for people in the winter. In many countries it was believed that evergreens would keep away witches, ghosts, evil spirits, and illness.

#### 13) What President started the White House Christmas Tree tradition?

A) In 1923, President Calvin Coolidge started the National Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony now held every year on the White House lawn.

INTERESTING NOTE: Teddy Roosevelt banned the Christmas tree from the White House for environmental reasons.

#### 14) What state first made Christmas a legal holiday?

- A) Alabama was the first in 1837. In 1907, Oklahoma became the last US state to declare Christmas a legal holiday. Of course Oklahoma wasn't a state until 1907.
- 15) What country group recorded "Christmas in Dixie" in the early 1980's?
  - A) Alabama
- 16) From which country does the poinsettia plant originate?
  - A) Mexico. It derives its common English name from Joel Roberts Poinsett, the first United States Minister to Mexico, who introduced the plant into the United States in 1825.
- 17) Who is the author of the traditional New Year's Eve song, Auld Lang Syne?
  - A) Robert Burns—national poet of Scotland—in 1788.
- 18) How many times does Santa check his list in the song "Santa Claus is coming to town"?
  - A) He's making a list and checking it twiceHe's gonna find out who's naughty or nice, '

# Wreaths Across America! 14 December 2024

This year, National Wreaths Across America Day was held on Saturday, December 14, 2024. More than two million volunteers and supporters gather annually to Remember, Honor and Teach at more than 4,600 participating locations in all 50 states, at sea and abroad.

Our chapter supports the event at the Pecan Grove Cemetery in McKinney where over 900 veterans are buried.

A commemorative event is held and following that volunteers spread out with maps and place wreaths on every veterans gravesite, speaking that veterans name to commemorate their service by name.

As we prepare our annual report to State and National on our chapters support of veterans, please help us report everything, including individual members support that your chapters board may not know about.

**ALL** Compatriots that are members of the Texas SAR can participate in this effort, so I am asking you to review your calendars and records of non-profit giving for this year and other activities noted below and send responses to chapter president **Bob Johns**. Your Chapter responses REALLY make a difference and strongly keep our State amongst the best in the SAR.

Authorized activities include:

- (1) Memorial Services/Funerals of any Veteran. Please send name of deceased veteran, date, location, your role if any, and distance(r/t) travelled.
- (2) Personal donations (check/cash) to a Veterans Service organization, such as Wounded Warriors, VFW, USO, Paralyzed Vets, Purple Heart, American Legion, Camp Hope, Tunnel for Towers, etc. I will NEED amount, date of gift, and organization that received your gift. The key to their qualification is: Is the organization's primary client the Veteran? If yes, it qualifies. For every mile driven/flown to a funeral, one point is credited. For every dollar donated, one point is credited.
- (3) Donations of clothing (new or used) to a Veterans Service organization, such as VFW, American Legion, Texas Paralyzed, Disabled Texas Veterans or Disabled American Veterans. Others are acceptable as well, BUT they must have Veterans as the Primary client. Please indicate date donated, organization name, and amount paid for new clothing (men or women). If donating used clothing, then credit is based on 1/3 of original price. For each dollar value of clothing donated, one point is credited.
- (4) Wreaths Across America Purchase of 3 wreaths for Wreaths Across America will make a Chapter qualified at 50 points minimum for their Stark report.
- (5) Personal cost incurred for Wreaths, Flowers, or Flags placed on the Graves of any Veteran.

# TO ALL PLANO SAR CHAPTER MEMBERS WHO SERVED DURING THE VIETNAM WAR ERA:

The Department of Defense (DoD) has authorized any veterans who served anywhere and in any capacity during the Vietnam Era, Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 to be eligible to receive a **Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin (VVLP)**.

Pins have previously been awarded at scheduled group events, but the DoD has now made it possible for eligible veterans to request a pin be delivered to their home address. This program is open to all Veterans, not just our chapter members, so if you know of eligible veterans not in our chapter, feel free to notify them of the program. If eligible Veterans have not previously received a pin, here is how one can be ordered:

- 1. Veterans who served anywhere in any capacity during the period Nov 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975 are eligible to receive a pin.

Alexander Walker was born in 1725 in Spartanburg, South Carolina. His father, Edmund, was 40 and his mother, Judith, was 38. He married Frances Ann Scott Walker on December 22, 1757, in Amelia, Virginia. They had two children during their marriage. He died in February 1808 in Spartanburg, South Carolina, having lived a long life of 83 years.

Alexander Walker served in the military in 1776 in Spartanburg, South Carolina, when he was 51 years old.






#### This Month's Fun Factoid



### The *Pennsylvania Gazette* and *Pennsylvania Journal* Turn Up the Heat in January of 1775





On 25 October 1774, the First Continental Congress ratified The Petition to the King, which called for the repeal of the Intolerable Acts.

On 6 November, the petition departed Philadelphia on board the ship Mary and Elizabeth, captained by N. Falconer. It was confirmed on December 14 that the document successfully arrived in London. The King's rejection of the Petition, was one of the causes of the later United States Declaration of Independence and American Revolutionary War.

In January of 1775, Benjamin Franklin published the text of the Petition in his newspaper, the *Pennsylvania Gazette*. The publisher of the *Pennsylvania Journal*, William Bradford, encouraged resistance to British taxation and other measures that threatened American colonists' traditional English liberties. This issue of the Journal from January 1775 bears the image of a rattlesnake cut into pieces, each representing an American colony or colonies, with the words "Unite or Die."

These articles reached the greatest part of the colonial population and were a contributing factor in stoking up resistance to Britain and movement toward independence.
