2026 Dues: It is that time again. The 2026 dues are coming up. The chapter urges you to pay your dues by December 31st as the dues are late after that date. After January 2026, you will be dropped from the rolls and would have to be reinstated to continue your membership. Do not rely on "snail mail" to pay your dues. The state and chapter urge you to use PayPal. It is fast, secure, and ensures there are no delivery problems.

2026 Online Dues Payment is now available

Dues Invoices have been posted to the [texassar.org](https://www.texassar.org) private website and are available to pay 2026 dues. For those of you who have a deliverable mailing address, your 2026 Dues Notices should be arriving in your home mail box within the next few weeks. These are sent Bulk Mail to your address of record as of September 1st. If you do not receive one by Thanksgiving, please check for your notice online and help us update your address.

Texas SAR approved no dues for Junior Members for 2026. Keep in mind that your dues are considered late on **January 1, 2026**. If they are still unpaid 30 days later, NSSAR will drop you from the rolls, and you will start to show a gap in your service and not get your magazine. To help the chapter and avoid problems, please pay dues via one of the below three options as soon as you can and avoid a lapse in your SAR Service!

(1) Online/Paypal - We encourage everyone to use this option and pay your dues by credit card through Paypal. Click or [go to https://www.texassar.org/dues.htm](https://www.texassar.org/dues.htm). Enter your National SAR # and name as it appears on your membership certificate (you must log into the private site. Contact Bob Watson, beaglebud@satx.rr.com if you have forgotten the username and password.) Select your primary chapter and others you maintain dual membership with and follow the checkout procedures. Dues payments are live on the [TexasSAR.org](https://www.TexasSAR.org) website now so pay early and avoid the rush. There are no PayPal fees for 2026 dues.

The online Paypal form also allows for secondary (dual) chapters to be added for those wishing to pay as a dual member.

(2) US Mail - Remove the bottom section of the dues invoice you receive in the mail and send a check for the amount indicated with the pre-addressed envelope, stamp it, and return it by US mail. This is your PRIMARY chapter dues statements - it only includes dues for your primary chapter, state, and national dues where applicable.

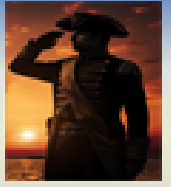
(3) US Mail - Use this option to pay by check, but did NOT get a dues notice in the mail or if you want to pay now. Contact the state treasurer for mailing address at treas@texassar.org
Please do not delay. Pay your dues now.

Colonial Attire: It is not required, but members who wish to participate in chapter activities are urged to obtain some combination of colonial attire. Wearing colonial attire makes a statement and promotes SAR to the community and the attendees of the various events where the chapter participates.

The last two newsletter issues, contained a list of popular sutlers for those that may be interested in purchasing a uniform or uniform pieces. As previously stated, there is no requirement to purchase colonial attire unless you want to participate in the color guard where it is required. Some just purchase various uniform pieces over time.

Please consider starting your colonial uniform. It is great exposure for SAR and the chapter and it is fun to see the reactions by the public to the dress and for the kids who want pictures with us.



Gideon Bowles – A Common Patriot: A small world it seems. Through separate research, Compatriot Mike Bowles, SA Chapter #4, discovered that Compatriot Dewey Owens, Boerne Chapter, share a common patriot and link to the Revolutionary War. Gideon Bowles, the son of Gideon, an Englishman who was a merchant in Dublin, Ireland. Son Gideon born circa 1735 came to Virginia and settled in Goochland County Virginia as a member of the St. James Colony. Gideon had 10 children. It is documented that he was a merchant who dealt favorably with the Continental Army and once donated 191 pounds of beef to them and for this, was so recognized as a patriot. It is also said he owned a toll bridge or toll road over which he allowed the Continental Army to pass without toll. Gideon died about 16 Sept. 1799 in Goochland. The core family migrated to St. Louis County, Missouri via Kentucky. From St. Louis (Fenton), Missouri descendants moved to the Indian Territory now called Oklahoma. Dewey Owens' family appears to have similarly migrated to the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations in the southeast of what is now Oklahoma. Mike Bowles family branch settled on the northern border of the Chickasaw nation next to the unassigned lands across the Canadian River from the town of Purcell. Further research to be conducted to complete the rest of the story.



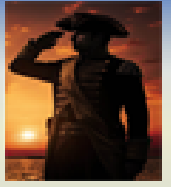

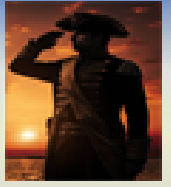

It is easy to forget that many other things were happening during the Revolutionary War period as it was so significant, not much else is talked or written about. However, there were many activities surrounding the war. Inventions were developed to solve problems of daily living during the times. A Proud Grandpa: Because of our mission, we continually concentrate on old news, historical facts, and stories of colonial times. It is rather nice to stray occasionally and reflect on some good news for our chapter members. Compatriot Larry Loop received notification recently that his grandson, Tyler Loop, had been drafted to the Baltimore Ravens NFL team in the 6th round and will be replacing their former #1 place kicker. Tyler graduated from the University of Arizona where he set several place-kicking records. He is the first kicker in over 30 years drafted by the Ravens.

Tyler succeeds Justin Tucker, the most accurate kicker in NFL history, who was released in May after being suspended by the league for 10 games for misconduct.

Tyler has proven to be accurate making 51 of 55 field goal attempts (92.7%) in team drills with one over 60 yards. It is reported that the team tracing system showed the kick would have cleared 67 yards. It appears the Ravens have discovered a hidden gem who will fill an important void in their system.

Congratulations to compatriot Larry and his grandson Tyler Loop. We will be watching and rooting for your continued success.

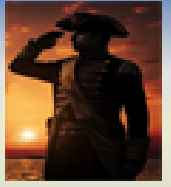

First Responder -Fire Rescue Awards: One of the most significant and important events the chapter does during the year is recognize the accomplishments of our first responders. Five major acts of bravery by fire rescue personnel were recognized during the October General Meeting on the 16th. Four received the Heroism Commendation and one received the Life Saving Commendation. Another member of the fire department was awarded the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Commendation. The Heroism Commendation recognizes outstanding bravery and self-sacrifice in the face of imminent danger to the recipient. The Life Saving Commendation is awarded to individuals who have acted to save a human life, but not necessarily placing themselves in imminent danger. The EMS Commendation is generally awarded to paramedics, who have performed an act or service beyond which is normally expected. This city is very blessed to have such extraordinary individuals serving for the citizens of the community. These five people are only a small group of outstanding first responders. Battalion Chief Doug Reed, Chief of Special Operations was our guest speaker telling us about the various services performed by members of the fire department daily and how they truly make a difference in the community.

Wreath Laying at Normandy American Cemetery

Sons of the American Revolution member, Larry Luckett, recently was honored to participate in the formal wreath-laying ceremony at the Normandy American Cemetery in Colleville-sur-Mer, France. Luckett was on vacation touring D-Day landing sites. He visited the Normandy American Cemetery on 15 August 2025. When a cemetery staff member asked for relatives of the fallen or for service veterans to join in the ceremony, Luckett stepped forward. Luckett is a veteran of the U.S. Army, retiring with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel after 22 years of service and is the Genealogist/Registrar for the San Antonio Chapter, Texas Society. Luckett was one of four military veterans who joined the ceremony to place a memorial wreath at the foot of the central sculpture representing the spirit of American youth rising.

Each day at 10:00 a.m., the American Battle Monuments Commission that maintains the cemetery conducts a ceremony honoring the 9,389 military dead in the surrounding graves and the 1,557 inscribed names of the missing. Most of these military dead lost their lives in the D-Day landings at Omaha Beach, only a quarter-mile from the cemetery. The emotion-filled ceremony includes the playing of the *Star-Spangled Banner*, a short acknowledgement and recognition of the sacrifice of the fallen, the laying of a wreath at the cemetery's Memorial, and the playing of *Taps*.

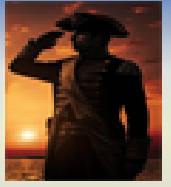

Air Force Birthday: Compatriot Frank Rohrbough joined two other VA Representatives at the Audie Murphy Memorial Hospital to celebrate the 77th Anniversary of the establishment of the US Air Force as an Armed Service on September 18, 1947. There were over 20 Air Force Veterans in attendance and each were given an Air Force cap, food bars and a lapel pin.

The Department of the Air Force was formally established on Sept. 18, 1947, months after the July 26 signing of the National Security Act. This established the Department of Defense, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the US Air Force as a separate armed service alongside the Army and Navy.

The military had air power for decades preceding the National Security Act, but it was primarily part of the Army Air Corps.

There are approximately 689,000 personnel, which includes active-duty airmen, Air National Guard, Air Force reservists, and civilian workers.

Colonial Medicine



Medicine and medical practices in America were of course very basic compared to modern standards, but some important developments and practices during colonial times shaped early American healthcare and laid the foundations of modern medicine.

There were many medical milestones, but the most notable were:

- 1) Apothecaries (early pharmacists) and midwives provided most all medical care and home remedies rather than trained physicians.
- 2) First Hospitals built were:
 - a) The first permanent hospital in the colonies was the Pennsylvania Hospital founded in 1751 in Philadelphia by Benjamin Franklin and Dr. Thomas Bond.
 - b) The New York Hospital, which was chartered in 1771.
- 3) Medical Schools were started the first of which were:
 - a) College of Philadelphia, later University of Pennsylvania, opened the first medical school in 1765 in the colonies.
 - b) King's College that became Columbia University, opened a medical department in 1767.

Notable Medical Practices & Achievements:

- 1) Quarantine Measures: Colonial governments used quarantines to control outbreaks of smallpox, yellow fever, and plague.
- 2) Midwifery Advancements: Midwives played a vital role in childbirth, using herbal remedies and passing down practical knowledge that improved maternal and infant survival.
- 3) Colonial medical schools began teaching anatomy through human dissection by the mid-1700s, which advanced scientific understanding significantly, despite social taboos.
- 4) During the French and Indian War (1754–1763) and early stages of the Revolution, military medicine made significant gains. Colonial doctors improved battlefield surgery, amputation techniques, and created and organized of military hospitals.
- 5) Smallpox inoculations were the forerunner of the vaccinations.
Hospitals, improved medical schools and training for physicians, advanced care, and vaccinations are considered the biggest medical achievements of colonial America.
